

Dave began by thanking Gloucester Rotary Club for celebrating Education and although education is constantly changing, the critical role of teachers in the process remains.

Teachers have a demanding job, they -

individualise learning, monitor social development of children, are expected to control classes and keep students on task, be creative, inventive and engaging in how they teach, be familiar with a range of technological devices and the benefits and problems associated with these.

Teachers work long hours planning, marking, resolving problems with students and parents but they do get satisfaction from students' learning and the relationships that are built.

Sometimes it seems like a race against time to ensure that the next generation is a bit more knowledgeable, better informed, wiser and more able to make better decisions than the previous generation.

Bruce's formal education began with six years at Barrington Public School with 30 students in one class taught by Mr Hinchey. Another year at Gloucester Public with Mr Toohey followed and then he began Gloucester High, the year it opened at its present site.

During High School, he had many excellent teachers – Col Moore for Mathematics, Fred Ring for Science, Leone Hooke and Jim Dean for English & History and the librarian, Mrs Mawson. He enjoyed all subjects but had a preference for Maths and Science which influenced his decision to study Civil Engineering at Newcastle University with a Cadetship with the Department of Main Roads. Technology was very different then – slide rules and logarithmic tables for calculations!

In 1973, Bruce returned to Gloucester as Deputy Shire Engineer, later the Shire Engineer and Town



Planner. After retiring from Gloucester Council he was enticed back to work for the RTA for another 15 years where he was involved in a varity of projects which all involved further learning.

Bruce's closing comment – Education continues all through your life, but the foundations are established by those early teachers who instil good work habits and a love of learning in their pupils. I owe them a big thankyou.'
