#### This week, we toast the Rotary Club of Great Lakes


Jim Worwitch is the current President and Peter Dreise is the Secretary of the club. The members meet on

The first gathering was attended by a small crowd with many unable to attend due to other commitments or simply not hearing about this event. Rotarian Pete is



hopeful that the second gathering will draw more crowds as this project has been broadcasted by the ABC Radio and there is also a write up in the local Gloucester Advocate. Those that were able to attend walked away with valuable information

and having the knowledge of how to start getting support and where to ask. There were speakers from Rural Aid, Local Land Services, One Door Mental Health, Rural Resilience Program, Bucketts Way Neighbourhood Group, CWA and Department of Human Services.

The Golf Club entrance was also stacked high with non perishable food that people had donated and dropped off at the Forster Bowling Club. Karen Newcombe and Greg Brown were the instigator behind this movement.









Audiences were informed that although over a million dollars have been raised through the combined effort of Channel Nine and the Farmers Federation, our District 9650 regions are still waiting for the approval of an allocated fund of \$250,000. But Rotarian Pete made it clear to the crowd the Rotary is not going anywhere and that we are here for the long haul, not just a short term solution. Well done Pete!!



Winner will be announced soon.


## Rotary Network Night with Li: Rotary Youth Programs – Gloucester Interact Club



President Elect Li welcome Rotarians and guests to the Networking Night. Special welcome to the three Interact presenters and their supporting parent, Interact Vice President Emily Dulihanty and her father, Paul, Interact Sergeant and Facebook admin Bella Yates and her mother Lee Clapson and sister Poppy Yates, and Secretary Riko Fitzgerald and Interactor/sister Josie and dad Ray Fitzgerald. Also welcome to Jodie House and Taryna Turner and her two daughters who are interested in learning about Interact.

Li started the presentation by sharing with the audience the different types of Rotary Youth Programs.

Rotary has an invested interest in grooming and supporting the next generation of Leaders. There are programs such as the RYEA (Rotary Youth Exchange Program), and RANZE (Rotary Australia and New Zealand Exchange Program) which host an international student in a different country where they will experience a different culture, people, language skills and venture out of their usual comfort zone. Programs such as RYDA (Rotary Youth Driving Awareness), RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards), were initiated to educate and instill leadership skills and boost self-confidence and self-esteems. Youth Public Speaking competitions utilizing the Rotary Four Way Test as the topic encourages



students to boost their public speaking skills and at the same time, growing their self-confidence literacy skills.



Interactors Emily, Bella and Riko then spoke to Rotarians about their newly chartered Interact Club. Currently, there are 16 members in the club and growing. The first few meetings were getting ideas for various projects, both locally and internationally, and fundraising ideas to fund these projects. Their first local project selected was to assist with the current Drought Crisis. Their aim is to raise \$1200 to buy 4 bales of hay. After a few hiccups and challenges, such as the high cost of copyright fee, plans were alterered accordingly so that they can still reach their goal. Hence on Friday 21st September, Interactors held their first Movie Fundraising Event at the Arrowee House. The Interactors had designed posters and flyers and tickets, decided on the food to sell and cater for, the limit of the size of attendees etc....

Rotarians were very supportive of this project and those that could not attend, made a donation to the cause.

The night ended with Sergeant Peter Markey drawing the raffles and those that could stay, enjoyed a very sociable dinner after meeting ends.




