How To Gain Money For Your Club or Organisation (Guest Speaker: Katrina Carlon)



On Tuesday 20th November, our club hosted a dinner meeting with representatives from community groups, schools and other clubs in attendance to listen to Katrina Carlon, Senior Grants Officer with Midcoast Council. Katrina was assisted by her husband Adrian Carlon who was in charge of the computer and screen presentation. He is an industrial officer with Midcoast Council

As a "Yepper" from 2000 - 2001 Katrina was very familiar with Rotary and how our club had funded the installation of the exercise stations within Gloucester District park over 4 to 5 years.

Katrina explained the steps to take for grant applications, such as how background need for a project should be researched, the importance of need for a project to be supported by public surveys, the need to have development approvals as a condition of many grant applications, how to obtain fairly reliable quotes for infrastructure or events, the working with other community groups to achieve common goals and the vital need for the applicant to have a proper legal

structure. Gloucester Rotary was given as an example on how to obtain grants for [exercise equipment] infrastructure. Katrina also discussed the importance of the applicant for a grant having an established legal entity with minutes of meetings confirming support for a project and grant application as well as the applicant having insurances, in some cases a fundraising authority from NSW Fair Trading and other matters. Staging a large project in stages [such as the Gloucester Rotary exercise stations] as individual projects meant it had had a better chance of obtaining small grants each year for several years.



Katrina informed the meeting that Council's website now has links to

demographic and other data for the official 3,050 residents in Gloucester. Ages and racial background, employment situation and pensioner status numbers are all available for use in grant applications.



The evening was divided into three segments to enable Katrina to have her presentation, then a discussion on the practical aspects of a grant application and finally there was a segment where the guests could ask questions. For example, Sarah Mansfield from the Gloucester Soldiers Club advised that the ground level auditorium was an evacuation centre that did not have a good air conditioning system for use by elderly persons during heatwaves or a modern kitchen; Bruce Snape from the Show committee advised that more and more caravans use the showground as a council approved primitive camping area, but the toilets and showers need upgrading. Bill Murray from Gloucester Country Club referred to the need to have a disabled persons toilet

with access from the golf course, not necessarily only through the club building; Robyn Beggs from Gloucester Netball Assoc. raised the difficulty of obtaining quotes and interest in replacing the surface of all of the netball courts to enable a grant application to be lodged. Matthew Bowden discussed whether the Bowden Brothers could seek an art and cultural grants to fund a tour from Gloucester to Tennant Creek to enable the Bowden Bros to provide free concerts to indigenous Australians and others.

Katrina provided suggestions to each of the representatives who explained the projects and she took detail. Katrina indicated her willingness to assist everyone in the Midcoast Council area with grant applications. She provided details of the websites where clubs may arrange for information regarding upcoming grants to be sent to the clubs.

After the meeting ended several of the guests hung around asking Katrina questions for another 30 minutes or so. It was a very successful evening. Well done Brian Beesley for arranging the night's activities.


